ACCIDENT FROM CRINOLINE

On Tuesday a rather distressing accident occurred in Woolmarket . A girl, seven years of age, daughter of Mr John Walker, Woolmarket, while carrying a child scarcely 2 years old upon her back was met by 2 women passing up the street who, with distended skirts, pushed against the girl in passing. The girl was thrown to the ground and one of her thighs was fractured. Either unconscious of the nature of the accident or heedless of the consequence, the women rendered no assistance but proceeded in leaving the poor girl to the care of others who witnessed the accident. The unfortunate girl has since been under surgical treatment.

TERRIBLE EXPLOSION AT BERWICK

THREE PERSONS KILLED

A terrible explosion of gunpowder which caused the loss of three lives, occurred on Saturday on the premises of Messers Caverhill & Co, ironmongers and cartridge manufacturers, Berwick. The shop, together with that of Mr Plenderleith, stationer, adjoining, was completely destroyed, the damage amounting to several thousands of pounds. The victims of the disaster are Mr Andrew Melville Caverhill, secretary of the Company, Mrs Taylor, wife of a gamekeeper, of Pithouses, Lamberton, and an apprentice named Gregson, the son of a Berwick hairdresser. Mr Andrew and Mr William Caverhill were waiting at their shop door for another brother, who was in an adjoining shop. The first was killed by the falling masonry and the other received various injuries, but none fatal. Mrs Taylor was buried by the debris, and died several hours after she had been extricated. The charred remains of the apprentice, Gregson, were recovered amidst the ruins of the cartridge-making room.

DIAMOND WEDDING OF A LAMBERTON TOLL COUPLE

Yesterday afternoon Mr and Mrs Richard Wood living in Middle Street, Spittal, Berwick, celebrated the sixtieth anniversary of their marriage, they having been married at Lamberton Toll on the 9th September 1837, by the famous Joe Aitchison who at that time was a well known figure at marriages solemnized at the Northern Gretna. Mr and Mrs Wood are natives of Spittal, where the old gentleman for many years followed the occupation of a fisherman and harbour pilot. Mr and Mrs Wood have had nine children, three of whom died young; while they have had 51 grandchildren and eight great grandchildren. They are still hale and hearty.

HENRY COLLINS

The important office of priest of Hymen at the celebrated temple of Lamberton Toll, has this week become vacant by the somewhat sudden demise of Mr Henry Collins, who has officiated for a period of nearly twenty years. The duties of the situation are by no means of a light description, there having been, we are told, during the last year, 330 marriages celebrated after this fashion., and the usual average of years is upwards of 300. The fees realised from these must have amounted to something considerable.

Suffering from a poisoned hand some folks have concluded that he has been wounded, but happily this is not the case. Private Burgon has seen three years service and was a blacksmith with Messers Caverhill. He is a son of Mr Alick Burgon, motor ferryman.
